he consistently works 14- to 16hour days. Although he has received résumés from people who want to be part of SLS, he said he prefers to work on his own. He has already placed four people in three months, and receives a referral fee from each community in which he places someone.

The biggest challenge Markowitz has faced so far is getting the word out. His goal is to make a name for himself in the community and let people know that this service is available. He works with nonprofit organizations in the area, and is involved with the Alzheimer's and Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS) associations.

He says there is much that families must deal with during this process, and it is important to have someone there who can

"It's so nice to be able to do a mitzvah for people and help them in a time of need. This is basically an apartment locator service for seniors," he said. "My parents always taught me to give back to people. I believe in what I am doing, and to help people out is worth it."

Gilcrest said she was overwhelmed and decided to turn to Markowitz, who had previously met her husband. Markowitz talked with Gilcrest and Wilkins. They filled out a survey about Wilkins' needs, then visited different communities.

"I probably would have gone to 20 places if he didn't go with me. He was a foot in the door," she said. "I was able to narrow it down, and then Dad made the final decision. He keeps in touch with my dad, and has become a good contact for him."

Wilkins lives at the Veranda Preston Hollow and is happy with his decision.

Gilcrest added that had it not been for SLS, this process would have been stressful and time-con-

"Paul had gone through a similar situation, so I knew he was someone who understood the frustrations of it. I really appreciate how he has staved in touch with Dad.
